His website (opens in new tab) gives you an idea of what he's about, being full of references to algorithms, ray tracing, 3D modelling and other programming tasks. If it's the image editing you're here for, however, you're in luck, as Photopea has a suite of advanced tools. The default dark grey skin makes it look like an Adobe product, as do the icons chosen for the toolbar. Understanding layers Once refined, your selection is copied and appears as a new layer with a transparent background in the Layers palette. Layers enable you to do tricks like replacing backgrounds, and changing the colours of parts of an image. Sharpen your images if you'd rather have a nice-looking photo than an exploding duck, there are tools to improve an image without slicing it up. Export your image There are buttons to export your currently selected layer as a PNG or SVG, but to export the whole image go to the File menu. From here you have the choice of saving your work as a PSD file, layers intact, or to export as a JPEG, PNG or many other popular formats.
